BEFORE YOU HUNT...

- Hunting has an honorable history, great traditions and a responsible code of practice that extends beyond hunting laws. If hunting is to continue as a respected and honorable activity, hunters must be responsible and accountable for their actions. With the privilege to hunt, you carry responsibility to other people, wildlife, and the environment.
- You are responsible to leave your hunting area in its original state. Pack out your waste and all equipment, and ensure you do not damage the land in any way.
- Land access is an important concern to all hunters. You are responsible to ensure that you have the proper permission and legal access prior to hunting.
- Be a safe hunter and respect other hunters in the field. Know the hunting regulations and report any violations to the nearest Fish and Wildlife Office or Report A Poacher line 1-800-642-3800

Process:

Each interested Mentor, Participant and Outfitter must complete the application form and return to Kelly Semple, Executive Director, Hunting For Tomorrow. Incomplete forms will not be accepted and the following conditions must be met for an application to be considered:

- Hunters must possess a valid Wildlife Certificate, Bowhunting Permit, and the appropriate hunting licenses.

Each hunter must meet the requirements of a resident as defined in the Alberta Hunting Regulations. Participants must have successfully completed the Conservation and Hunter Education Program and we recommend the completion of the International Bowhunter Education Program.

1. **Site:** 4 Wing Cold Lake
2. **Location:** 4 Wing Cold Lake Base - designated areas on the base (west of Cold Lake)
3. **WMU:** 501
4. **Partners:** 4 Wing Cold Lake
5. **Dates:** September 3, 2008 through November 30, 2008
6. **Equipment that may be used:** Bow and Arrow
7. **Species eligible to be hunted under this program:** Whitetail Deer

Important Notes

1. Whitetail deer or Mule Deer may be harvested at the 4 Wing Area under this program.
2. Animals should be field-dressed on the designated HFT property.
3. There is a resident wolf population on this property. We are **NOT** authorized to hunt wolves under this program.
4. Quad access is permitted. Quads should be unloaded from either the south or north parking areas. When parking Quads in the hunting area, they should be discreetly parked (it is not necessary to park them in plain site or along the runway fence).
5. Do not drive on the Iron Horse Trail, as there is a substantial fine for this violation.

Parking

South Parking Area: When traveling on HWY 28, turn West at Sam's Auto Rescue corner, head 2 miles West and follow road as it turns south and proceed to abandoned train trestle (no tracks). Park in the area North, between trail and cutline.

North Parking Area: Junction of HWY 55 and SR 897 turn South and enter the rear access to the base (approximately 10 km West of Cold Lake). Immediately after passing through the gate, turn to the right and park in the gravel pad area. Please do not block any roads. These gates open at 6:00 am and close at 10:00 pm.
